Starting GCSEs

Starting GCSEs is a big step from Year 7 and 8 work. The work we have to complete is a lot more independent and needs to be completed by certain deadlines to ensure that we are ready for our GCSEs.

One example of meeting deadlines is in Creative iMedia as we have had to complete many different types of work about comics which we have had to do by ourselves and by a deadline; this is so we get used to handing things in on time.

In English, we have had to do many practice assessments based on a GCSE text. This is practice for the rest our assessments up to the finals in Year 11. This year so far we have been studying 'Of Mice and Men'- a short novel which is far more mature and complex than Year 7 and Year 8 texts. This allows us to get higher marks in our tests as we have a deeper understanding of techniques used in GCSE texts.

GCSE P.E. is a new subject for us, as in Year 7 and 8 we only had Core P.E. which is only practical lessons, whereas in our P.E. we now have 2 lessons of theory and 1 lesson of practical every week. This allows us to carry out the methods of training that we have learned in theory and apply them in practical lessons.

Altogether, in GCSE we have to work a lot harder and complete work independently and on time. Overall we have to do our best at all times as it shapes our future.

The student of the lesson is a reward for those who work hard in class. Teachers hand out slips for Student of the Lesson with the student's name on it. The students hand this slip into our Director of Year, Mrs Nolan, and she rewards them by inviting them to a tea party during tutor time at the end of the week. Year 10 Highlights - PERU EXPEDITION 2019

In August 2019 some Cannock Chase High School students will be participating in a 4 week **life changing opportunity** in Peru. The trip is organised by Camps International and our students will be joining with students from other schools across the UK to participate in this amazing experience.

They will spend 3 weeks of their trip carrying out community work which will include toilet building in the small rural community in Moray - a community which is extremely poor with no basic sanitation or sewerage. Time will also be spent working on school improvement in Titicaca and Colca by helping to continue to build community facilities and a classroom for the villagers.

After the 3 weeks of community work, students will then spend 5 days trekking Salkantay Trail to the sacred ancient ruins of Machu Picchu, through the world-famous Andes Mountain range.

In order to raise the £4,500 they need to fund this experience, students have undertaken a number of fundraising activities including; car washing, cake sales, Christmas Fairs, bag packing in the local Tesco and completing sponsored events.

Aleasha Lancaster says, "I have always been adventurous, and this is a challenge of a life time.

I wanted to make my fundraising fun and not just everyday events like sales and car washing, I have done those too, but I did a sponsored Bubble Rush that involved running 5kms through 4 bubble colour baths.

I raised money for Cancer Research by entering, and got support for my efforts. I have another challenge to do - a sky dive. I am quite close to my target now but still have kit to get and the injections to pay for, along with getting a new passport. I would like to thank everyone who has supported me. My next challenge was to drive. I went to a specialist centre and drove around for an hour. It was great fun and I learned a lot."



Anna Scott says, "Once we began, we realised how much we had underestimated setting up our first fundraiser.

We were able to plan many events ahead of time: car washing, INSET day bake sales, discos, bag packing and many more. My first individual fundraiser was the creation of my very own puzzle book inspired by the food, wildlife and culture of Peru which not only managed to make an amazing £50 but taught me of everything I would be experiencing when we go out there.

I have been doing a sponsored 5K run every Saturday. I received the most generous donation of a month's supply of ice cream to use as a raffle prize as the Christmas period approaches. When I first began, I was shocked at how willing and generous companies were."

Preparing young people for the world of work

22 Year 10 students join the Career Ready programme at Cannock Chase High School

Since 2002, Career Ready have connected employers with schools and colleges to provide young people aged 14-18 with mentors, internships, masterclasses, and employer-led activities that prepare them for the world of work. This is the second year Cannock Chase High School have taken advantage of this fantastic opportunity. Local employers visit school once each month to work with the groups of students and prepare them for the world of work. Each session builds on the last, with a small group of Career Ready students and the volunteer from the world of work. The programme is running from October 2018 until June 2019. During the programme students with their mentors, reflect on their progress mapped against Skills for Career Success learning outcomes, including: Communication & Networking, Organisational Skills, Managing Myself and Problem Solving & Analysis Skills.

Cannock Chase High School prefects 2018 - 2019 are a mix of academic abilities who represent the best of

The student group is led by the Director of Year 11, Miss Denise Jinks, who works with the prefects to encourage the voice of the students at Cannock Chase High School to be heard and acted upon. The prefects are a group of selfless individuals who not only give a voice to the students and represent the high standards set at Cannock Chase High School but who also partake in duties around the school such as buddying younger years, monitoring corridor behaviour to ensure expectations are being met, supporting younger students in the completion of homework tasks and

offering extra guidance in subject areas where students may feel they are struggling a little. The Director of Year 11 and the Leadership Team at Cannock Chase High School are impressed with the way in which this year's Prefect Team have embraced their role and our congratulations and thanks go to them. These students set the benchmark for others to follow and are preparing themselves for future leadership roles.

Y11 Road Safety Assembly

On 19th September 2018, students of Year 11 and staff alike were given an important message from the Staffordshire County Council on Road Safety. Year 11 students are fast approaching being seventeen, the age at which you can drive in the UK, and many may have friends who are already of driving age meaning it is vital we are made aware of how to be safe in a vehicle. The assembly was, at



times, awfully harrowing and relayed tragic stories of death and injury on the roads. Shocking facts and statistics were given for us to reflect on. Did you know, the leading cause of death among girls aged 17-20 years of age is their boyfriend's bad driving? Or that 234 teenagers were killed in car accidents during 2014 alone? Road traffic accidents account for around 15 per cent of all deaths for young adults aged between 15 and 25 years and over a fifth of all deaths amongst people aged between 15 and 19 years.

The main issue raised was the lack of teenagers who wear seatbelts. In the assembly, we were asked to raise our hand if we had ever been on a journey, no matter how long or short, and not worn our seatbelt. Almost everyone in the room raised their hands. It's awfully concerning, but having seen the disastrous consequences of not wearing one, I personally would not ever even think about not wearing one! Did you



know if you are in the back seat of a car, behind the driver in a crash without a seatbelt on, you will travel forward at the same speed the car was travelling at on impact and collide with the back of the driver's seat, likely to result in you crushing the driver between the steering wheel and the seat? The moral of the assembly was, just wear a seatbelt for goodness sake! I, myself (Noah Hill, 11E) know of the

benefits of wearing a seatbelt, having being in a serious accident. I may have sustained some painful injuries, but because of my seatbelt, they were much less damaging. No matter who's driving, how safe you think they are, how close your destination is, please just wear your seatbelt. You can be the best driver in the world and have everything ruined by somebody else.

I really enjoyed the morning supporting the children and they were an excellent reflection on the school." Another said, "The students were very good, and it was nice to be able to give some of them some positive feedback in person at the end of the interview."



So, overall the mock interviews were a success in preparing us for the pressure of working life after school; there's even an interview to get into college or our own sixth form, but now we feel prepared!
