Course: AQA A GCE Advanced Level Psychology

Entry Requirements: GCSE English grade 5, GCSE Biology or Core/Additional Biology units at grade 5 and GCSE Maths at grade 5.

Aims of the Course:

This is a highly popular course, suitable for all students, and complements both Science and Arts subjects.
What is Psychology? '... An ongoing process of trying to gain insights into the awe-inspiring complexity of human thought and action.' Hassett (1984)

Course Content:

The course is divided into three units which are taken in Year 13 and each unit is assessed by multiple choice, short answer and extended writing questions. Each exam is 2 hours long and contributes to 33.3% of the total marks. Overall, at least 10% of the marks in assessments for Psychology will require **the use of mathematical skills**.

UNIT 1

Social Psychology – Obedience and Conformity asking ‘Why we do the things we do’?

Cognitive Psychology – Models of memory; types of long term memory and explanations of forgetting.

Developmental Psychology – Explanations of human attachment and the impact it has on relationships.

Individual Differences and Psychopathology - Defining abnormality; explaining phobias, depression and OCD; and how we treat abnormality.

UNIT 2

Approaches in Psychology – Comparing various approaches in psychology which include: the learning, cognitive, biological, psychodynamic and humanistic schools of thought.

Biological Psychology – The nervous system; the structure and functions of various neurons; the endocrine system; the fight or flight response; the functions of various parts of the brain and techniques used to study this; and biological rhythms.

Research Methods – Gathering and deploying data by studying experimental and non-experimental methods, and analysing and presenting data. This includes understanding **inferential testing and the use of algebraic symbols**.

UNIT 3

Issues and debates in psychology – a consideration of concepts such as free will and determinism; gender and cultural bias in psychology; the nature-nurture debate, etc. In this unit you will also develop knowledge, understanding and skills of analysis and evaluation in relation to **three** topics selected from the following: **Relationships, Gender, Cognition and Development, Schizophrenia, Eating Behaviour, Stress, Aggression, Forensic psychology and Addiction**

Assessment: You will complete a minimum of 2 graded assessments per half term. Assessment will be based on content and exam technique in order to prepare students fully for the exam.
